#### Show and Tell

Rob Lowe introduced Grant Schroeder and talked a little about Grant's last semester at UTA majoring in Aerospace Engineering. Solid Mechanics has been the most inspirational class and just finished taking last semester Fluid Dynamics, Thermal Dynamics and Dynamics which was a tough semester. Grant was able to maintain a GPA of just shy of a 3.5 average this past semester. Rob also brought up the subject asking about going too fast snowboarding which in turn caused a crash. The locals at Taos called his accident a Tomahawk stunt, Grant broke both ankles and got to come down the mountain on a snow patrol sled.

Grant talked about his new Top Flite Giant scale P-51. The plane was stripped of its original covering scheme of Big Beautiful Doll and recovered in the Obsession scheme of baby blue and yellow. The engine is a DA-70 twin cylinder turning an F1 prop (20X18), Robart electric retracts, Spectrum twenty channel power safe receiver, Demon gyro, Hi Tec servos 7985MG and 4-40

ball link with titanium pushrods. Grant has been able to clock the top speed so far at 174 mph using the Spektrum GPS module.

The plane took about a year to put together mostly because Grant only was able to work on the weekends building it. The cowl, bottom wing scoop and canopy had to be repainted with automotive paint that was matched at English Color. Custom made exhaust pipes and polished to a chromed like finish. The pilot is a 3D printed version of the Star Wars bounty hunter Boba Fett that was hand painted. Total weight is twenty four pounds. Hoping to be faster than you.

One of the things grant has learn over the last year at school and building the P-51 is to check and recheck after every flight every bolt and component of your plane. Something is always loose or in need of repair.

Raffled off several items as everyone who attended got one raffle ticket. We have finally raffled off the last of the coffee mugs.

#### Safety: by Ed Kettler

Welcome to summer! It has really picked up in the heat department, so please pay attention to hydration, sunscreen and summer critters.

Drink plenty of fluids BEFORE you head to the field, and bring plenty of liquids with you. In addition to water, please consider sports drinks to replace electrolytes. Make sure you protect your skin with broad brimmed hats and sunscreen. Bug spray may be useful to repel flying pests, but also look out for "Comrade No Shoulders" (snakes), spiders, and stinging insects.

I received a couple of alerts of some questionable flying practices that I want to talk about. Planes should land on the runway or on the grass east of the runway, and not in the grass safety area between the runway and the safety fencing. Also, no flight operations, including hovering, should be done west of the runway. This excludes operations in the foam/helicopter area Be smart, be safe, have fun!

#### Members' Projects: by Woody

#### Betty Boop Pistol Packin Mama

Betty was named after original pilot, Captain James Geary's wife and flew her first mission on 12th Aug 1943. She would go on to complete 61 operations, many times flying as the lead aircraft in the group. On the 25th Feb 1944, she was shot down on a mission to Hanover by enemy fighters. Pilot Robert Bowman and tail gunner Carl Phillips were killed and the remainder of the crew would become prisoners of war.

A General once passed the aircraft and noticed the nude pin-up on the side of the nose. He ordered "Put some pants on that!". Somehow, she seemed to remain without underwear until her loss.

History

B-17F SN 230434 Betty Boop The Pistol Packin' Mama Assigned 390th Bomb Group 570th Bomb Squadron Framingham Suffolk England August 1943 - February 1944 Aircraft Letter: A Last mission: Hanover Germany



Our daughter in law's father, Marshal Peck, Crew 51, was radio operator on this aircraft and flew 17 missions before being shot down in February 1944 and remained a POW till the end of the war in 1945.

I've always wanted to build and fly a B-17 and finally mustered the courage to tackle the task. The subject B-17 chosen was "Betty Boop The Pistol Packin' Mama". Unable to find a B-17F version available I settled for the Freewing B-17G. The Freewing version landing gear operates the same as the full sized B-17 in that it utilizes a scissors mechanism rotating forward.

The build was pretty much straight forward and really the only major modification was in the graphics and overall paint scheme.



As can be seen the kit out of the box was overall aluminum. Taking one major assembly at a time I started with the underside and painted it grey. The top side was painted olive drab. Two coats were applied to the air frame. Home depot carries the Behr brand of paint and it comes in pint jars. This is a base coat of white and pigment must be added for the desired color. This is a latex based paint and I applied it using a 1 inch foam brush. For best results allow the first coat to completely dry before applying a second coat.



Graphics were handmade stencils transferred to monocote trim sheets. Roy's sells water transfer sheets for ink jet printers. Print your graphic, spray a clear gloss or matt coat, trim to size, add to water and apply to the desired location. This works great but when applying the figures to the green background they blended in and were hard to see. To solve this problem I reprinted onto a white monocote trim sheet, clear coated the figures and cut to size. I then applied the art as any trim sheet would be applied.



#### Academy of Model Aeronautics National Model Aircraft Safety Code

Effective January 1, 2018

A model aircraft is a non-human-carrying device capable of sustained flight within visual line of sight of the pilot or spotter(s). It may not exceed limitations of this code and is intended exclusively for sport, recreation, education and/or competition. All model flights must be conducted in accordance with this safety code and related AMA guidelines, any additional rules specific to the flying site, as well as all applicable laws and regulations.

#### As an AMA member I agree:

- I will not fly a model aircraft in a careless or reckless manner.
- I will not interfere with and will yield the right of way to all human-carrying aircraft using AMA's See and Avoid Guidance and a spotter when appropriate.
- I will not operate any model aircraft while I am under the influence of alcohol or any drug that could adversely affect my ability to safely control the model.
- I will avoid flying directly over unprotected people, moving vehicles, and occupied structures.
- I will fly Free Flight (FF) and Control Line (CL) models in compliance with AMA's safety
  programming.
- I will maintain visual contact of an RC model aircraft without enhancement other than
  corrective lenses prescribed to me. When using an advanced flight system, such as an
  autopilot, or flying First-Person View (FPV), I will comply with AMA's Advanced Flight
  System programming.
- I will only fly models weighing more than 55 pounds, including fuel, if certified through AMA's Large Model Airplane Program.
- I will only fly a turbine-powered model aircraft in compliance with AMA's Gas Turbine Program.
- I will not fly a powered model outdoors closer than 25 feet to any individual, except for myself or my helper(s) located at the flightline, unless I am taking off and landing, or as otherwise provided in AMA's *Competition Regulation*.
- I will use an established safety line to separate all model aircraft operations from spectators and bystanders.
